WHO? Awkward City is a young visual performance company with a creative focus addressing perceptions of society and interaction and the complexities of the real world. They are interested in pushing the body beyond certain boundaries of physical control and discipline throughout the development of their work.

WHAT? Awkward City says: We have been exploring the various dimensions of relationships - and the preconceptions society brings to them - through sensory images, illusions and shadows. We are in the very early stages of developing material and wish to continue exploring interactions and the difficulties of communication within relationships through the real and the fake.

WHO? The Plasticine Men are a loose collective of irreverent theatre-smiths, scouring the land for stories that beg to be told onstage.

WHAT? The Plasticine Men say: This is just the second outing for some first ideas in response to a true story that fascinates us. It is also the first time that any of us have worked together to make theatre. We are trying to discover how we can do justice to a very rich tale, and whether this project has the legs to develop into a full piece. We hope, and dare to believe, that it has...

3. AN EXTRAORDINARY ORDINARY DAY

Once

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WHO? Since 2003 Once have been creators of poetic happenings and magical performance events, marking the day-to-day and the extraordinary of our lives. Using theatre and performance as a framework, Once's work explores how artists can facilitate and address the human need to mark significance, whether an historical or global event, a local river, a birth, the story of your day today or a family recipe.

WHAT? *The years turn and the rhythms repeat, each with a different melody. I lost my mother today, my mother died today, but the traffic lights are still changing and the radio babbles on.*

Once says: *An Extraordinary Ordinary Day* is a perpetual performance exploring how death and loss are at once totally intimate yet universal, extraordinary and yet everyday. It is in the middle of its devising process and we will be using tonight specifically to explore and test the methods of interaction we use with our participants. This piece has been commissioned by West Midland Strategic Health Authority and is to be publicly presented at Mayfest and in public space in Birmingham in June 09. *An Extraordinary Ordinary Day* is the second piece in our 'Lifting the Lid' programme of performance work that explores death and dying in modern society.

Tittle-Tattle Theatre

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WHO? Tittle-Tattle Theatre is a recently formed collective of Bristol-based artists with experience in community theatre and playwriting, school drama, performance art and devised theatre. The members are Jan Wozniak (writer), Sarah McCormack (director) and Saini Manninen (performer). This production is their first collaboration.

WHAT? Tittle-Tattle says: Based on Shakespeare's *The Taming of the Shrew*, this one-woman performance explores the complex nature of the play's depiction and realisation of women, and experiments with performance particularly in relation to issues of gender. In the course of the performance, Kate examines her role as a woman in contemporary society, the pressures which she faces and the reasons she has become the woman she already is. We are in the early stages of writing and devising. This piece requires its audience to consider questions of location in performance and we will explore issues of space and performance during the development process.

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WHO? Angus is a writer/performer, Wayne is a street performer and clown, and Holly is a clown, circus, street and cabaret artist.
